**Theoretical Fables** - Alicia Borinsky 2015-09-11

Alicia Borinsky argues that the contemporary Latin American novel does not just ingeniously dismantle the referential claims of the more traditional novel; it offers a postmodern version of the lessons taught by fiction. Latin American fiction, perhaps the most inventive literature of recent decades, seems marked by its self-reflexivity, by its playful relationship to history and the everyday, and by its concerns with the ways in which language works. But is it, Borinsky asks, really a literature whose primary goal is to raise

metafictional questions about writing and reading? In this light she studies the works of Jorge Luis Borges, Gabriel García Márquez, Julio Cortázar, José Donoso, Adolfo Bioy Casares, Manuel Puig, and María Luisa Bombal.

Dorothy said that sharing her life story is to help others learn, as she did, how to build bridges in their lives, then use them as a catalyst to help surmount, sustain, and transport them over life's challenges into successes and fulfillments. Also, her autobiography's purpose is to teach others, who may be experiencing some of the problems that she encountered, how to prepare and execute "Protection Plans" for personal enlightenment, enrichment, encouragement and eternal survival.
